ood 'ole 2025 summer was special to the Franciscan Sisters of Christian Charity. They held a General Chapter from June 16-24. Chapter is a term derived from earliest monks who gathered periodically to discuss their experiences, to renew their commitment to their way of life, and to daily read a chapter of

their rule. Eventually the daily reading of a chapter of the rule resulted in the meeting named Chapter.

When there were eight brothers,

Francis called them together, exhorted them on their way of life, and sent them out by twos to announce peace and penitence. Periodically, he would call them together to hear about their experiences and encourage them. This became a pattern in the life of the brothers.

As the order grew, Francis established Chapters. At the beginning, the saint held two annual Chapters, Pentecost and the Feast of St. Michael. Soon the meeting was held only once

at Pentecost. The most renowned Chapter is the Chapter of Mats. Francis said that five thousand brothers gathered, and they slept on reed mats. Francis presented his newly drafted written rule. Two years later in 1223, Francis introduced the rule approved by Pope Honorius III. A General Chapter every six years is normal practice for religious

congregations today.

June 16-24, 2025, marked the time of the General Chapter of the Franciscan Sisters of Christian Charity. Under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, forty delegates were elected by the community-at-large to

participate in the Chapter. Its purpose is to inspire the membership, conduct business for future direction, and elect the leadership. For six months the delegates worked on creating proposals from the ideas and concerns of the Sisters. During the week of business, each proposal was presented, discussed, and voted for passage. Electronic devices made the voting go smoothly.

enesis HealthCare System offers many resources to support the health and well-being of its team members. From wellness education and monthly step goals to social activities and daily reflections, these offerings encourage and celebrate employee wellness.

Physical wellness

Many wellness goals are available, such as a new six-month program called Wellness Initiatives. Team members can choose from 13 programs aimed at improving and maintaining healthy habits. Programs include weight loss, exercise classes, A1C and BMI clinics, food tracking, wellness coaching sessions, and financial and mindfulness courses.

Team members can also schedule appointments with the Wellness Office to discuss health goals or take a break in the mindfulness room, which has massage chairs, yoga mats, and a calming atmosphere.

Social wellness

Events helped raise donations for food pantries, including the 2025 Operation Feed campaign, an annual fundraiser benefiting the local food network. In June, members of the Mission Champions team presented a check for \$4,618, which will purchase over \$46,000 in groceries for families in need this summer.

Each year, many Genesis team members look forward to Summer Family Fun tickets. These discounted tickets are available for local and state summer attractions. This year, team members purchased 6,900 tickets. Summer Family Fun tickets are one of the many ways Genesis shows appreciation to its team members. 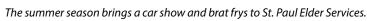
